






LEARNING TOGETHER


RESTORING MUSIC


STAINED GLASS

in vegetable mixes. These are sent all over the world to people who need more food.

Grade 8 were first taken on a building tour where we learned about their projects. They were shown where the vegetables were washed, cut, diced, dehydrated, packaged, and transported. Then they spent a few hours helping: the boys cutting the defects and mould off the vegetables, and the girls doing the packaging. In the packaging room, the girls scooped the different dehydrated vegetable pieces into mixes and bagged and sealed them. They ended up packaging 800 bags in 3 hours, meaning that they packaged 80,000 servings for people all over the world.
