A note from Our Board Chair


As we enter this Christmas season, the Board is grateful for God's steady provision and the faithfulness of our GCCS community.

On behalf of the Board of Directors, we wish you a Merry Christmas. May the hope of Christ fill your homes with joy and peace.




#1 SEPTEMBER

Throughout the month, students learned that God's name is special and deserves our respect. #3 NOVEMBER

November Theme: Your Kingdom Come

In November, our theme was "Your kingdom come"—a beautiful reminder that we want God's ways to rule in our world. Our memory verse, Luke 17:21 — "The kingdom of God is in your midst" — encouraged us to see that God's kingdom isn't just somewhere far away, but alive and present in us today. Throughout the month, students explored what it means to live out God's kingdom values of peace, love, and doing what is right. We learned that when we show kindness, seek justice, and care for others, we help bring God's love into the world—right here, every day.



GUELPH CAKES

AN INTERVIEW BY

On Thursday, November 27th we interviewed April Del Monte, the owner of Guelph Cakes. When she walked into the room where we were doing the interview, the first thing we noticed was her kind smile and relaxed vibe, nothing like we imagined a 'business owner' would be. We began talking, and April explained to us how she originally got into making cakes. "I was not planning on this becoming my job, it was just something I was passionate about," April said. Her first time baking a cake was when she made a birthday cake for her little boy who was turning one. "It wasn't anything fancy, just a smash cake, but I was proud of it, and a few years later I decided to post it on social media," April explained, smiling. "Someone online saw it and sent me a picture of a vintage heart cake, and asked if I could make it for them. It continued from there." April went on to say that she did not particularly like baking, or the kitchen - it was decorating the cakes which she enjoyed. One thing she said that stood out most to us was: "I didn't choose it, it chose me."



We asked her how she learned to make such incredible cakes. "I'm actually self taught," she revealed. "I watched a few YouTube videos, and searched Pinterest for inspiration, but otherwise it was all experimenting, trial and error." She went into more detail about the icing she uses, and other little things which we did not realize affects how a cake looks. "It took me about half a year to nail it, but even now I am learning and improving." She showed us one of the cakes she had made, and it was amazing! Covered in little delicate swirls, intricate designs on all sides, and mini roses dotted on the smooth white icing. She mentioned how, due to her elaborate designs, she did not have many flavours of cake and stuck to one style. "If I could, I would accept all requests for my cakes, and it is hard to say no, especially because cakes are always for some kind of celebration, but I have to rest, and I want to spend time with my children." She teared up. "Being a mum is my number one priority."

One thing we really wanted to know was what she thought about our school, and why she had chosen it



for her two children. "I love that it is such a close knit community, and the love we feel from everyone - teachers, students, parents..." she remarked. "Sometimes I see girls playing with my daughter, and calling out to her when they see her around. It is heartwarming to see so many people caring for her, and one another." She also told us that she loves the chapels that we have each week, and all the connections she sees around the school.

Later on, she mentioned her favourite cake that she had made. "I may not be able to remember names, but I can remember every cake that I have made," she insisted. She described a woodland fairy themed cake, with green icing, little purple flowers, and tiny mushrooms dispersed across the cake. It sounded enchanting, and magical, even though it was just a cake.

We developed a newly found appreciation, not only for the work that April does, but also the passion she has for it. Which made more sense when she gave



us some advice for anyone wanting to start their own business. "Make sure that whatever you do, it is something you are passionate about, because owning a business is hard, and your passion is what helps you through," she shared. "You also want it to be necessary, for there to be some kind of need for what you are offering, or else no one will use it. I guess there's a need for vintage cakes..."

She went on to tell us her two favourite Bible verses, both of which hung heavy in her heart. Isaiah 1:17, "Learn to do right, seek justice. Defend the oppressed. Take up the cause of the fatherless; plead the case of the widow." and Psalm 34:18, "The Lord is near the brokenhearted and saves those who are crushed in spirit." April leaned forward as she told us about the "The Cake Box Collective" that she was doing with Michael House for Christmas. The point of this project was to fill cake boxes with gifts to mothers who were going through hard times. The goal is to turn this into an annual tradition.

As we were leaving, we were struck with how generously April gave to those around her, using her business to help others she didn't even know.




GRADE 1




GRADE 2

I SERVING HOPE HOUSE

Grade 2 has been excited to partner with Hope House for a meaningful service project! Each month we take large quantities of toilet paper and package them into bags of 2 or 4 rolls. These are then distributed at the Hope House Food Market to families in need. A representative from Hope House came to speak to our class about what Hope House does and who it serves, empowering us and showing how our work makes a real difference. As we packed the rolls, we learned that even small acts of service can have a big impact. This is a fantastic way for young children to do real work to meet real needs of real people.

We felt proud knowing that our efforts would help families in our community and show God's love in action!



Grade 2 had a memorable trip to the Donkey Sanctuary, where we learned important words like *neglect*, *sanctuary*, *synergy*, *empathy*, and *compassion*. We discovered that each donkey has its own story that brought it to the sanctuary, and that the seemingly "menial" tasks done by volunteers—cleaning pens, sweeping, and keeping things tidy—are essential for providing a safe home for the donkeys. We quickly saw the connection between the Donkey Sanctuary and Hope House. As one student reflected, "The Donkey Sanctuary is a safe place for donkeys, and Hope House is a safe place for people." We realized that, just like the donkeys, every person has a story we may not know, and that our contributions, like packaging toilet paper for Hope House, make a real difference.

After the trip, each student had the chance to present a donkey to sponsor. While there were many great choices, the class voted to sponsor Peggy, a donkey with contracted tendons and mechanical laminitis who recently received innovative glue-on therapeutic shoes to ease her discomfort. Each student contributed \$2 toward Peggy's sponsorship, proudly sharing how they earned their donation. It was a wonderful experience that helped us connect compassion, empathy, and action in meaningful ways.



I BIRTHDAY BLESSINGS!

Grade 2 has a special tradition for celebrating class birthdays! We place the birthday student in the middle of our circle and take turns sharing words of blessing and affirmation. 


I WE LOVE SCIENCE




I INDOOR RECESS FUN




WAR RE-ENACTMENT

Grade 7 recently brought history to life with an energetic re-enactment of the British-French conflict in North America. Students stepped into roles as British troops, French soldiers, and First Nations. They dramatized key British victories, including the captures of Fort Louisbourg, Fort Frontenac, and Fort Duquesne, before recreating the dramatic final battle: the British quietly sailing past French guards, climbing the cliffs, and winning the Battle of the Plains of Abraham. The activity ended with the fall of Quebec City and the deaths of both "General Wolfe" and "General Montcalm", making this hands-on lesson a fun and memorable way to experience history.
